

# ASSOCIATE OF ARTS TRANSFER DEGREE IN SOCIOLOGY

## Overview

The **Associate of Arts Transfer in Sociology** (AAT–Sociology) degree is designed for students intending to transfer to a sociology or sociology/anthropology program at an Oregon public university. The curriculum includes foundational coursework in sociology and general education requirements that prepare students for upper-division study.

Completion of the AAT–Sociology degree also fulfills the statewide Major Transfer Map (MTM) (<https://www.oregon.gov/highered/about/transfer/Documents/Transfer-Resources/Transfer%20MOUs/Sociology-MTM-CAP.pdf>) for Sociology and the Oregon Core Transfer Map (CTM) (<https://catalog.mhcc.edu/degree-certificate-requirements/oregon-transfer-foundational-curriculum/>), supporting efficient transfer and application of credits toward a bachelor's degree.

Students planning to pursue a **Bachelor of Arts (BS)** in Sociology should follow the **Associate of Arts Transfer in Sociology** (AST–Sociology) degree.
